Death of a student in Year 3

Year 3 students and everyone in the Medical School were saddened when we heard of the sudden death of Ottilie (Ottie) Uden on Friday 13th October. She died from an extraordinarily rare condition. Ottie was a popular student, who at the time of her death was studying Junior Medicine and Surgery in South Bristol. Our thoughts go out to her family and friends.

Grants for conferences

Have you been put off submitting an abstract or registration for a meeting by the cost of a conference?

Student grants to help with conference travel costs: deadline 27 October

The Alumni Foundation offers financial support to students to help with the costs involved in travelling to conferences to present their research findings. Every student is eligible to apply for a travel grant worth up to £500. Key points about this are here:

- Every student at the University of Bristol is eligible to receive (a) travel grant(s) during his/her studies at Bristol worth (i) a maximum £500 during his/her undergraduate or intercalator course(s); and (ii) worth a maximum of £500 during his/her postgraduate course(s). In each case, this award may be made in the form of either a single grant or several smaller grants. Applicants who have access to other sources of funding for travel (through his/her scholarship, studentship and/or research group, if applicable) should exhaust these funds before applying to the Alumni Foundation.
- Applicants must be fully registered fee-paying students and must be registered at the time of the conference.
- In exceptional circumstances, where an application cannot be made to fit into the normal timetable, the Chair of the Alumni Foundation has the discretion to consider applications between meetings. In such cases, the maximum amount that can be awarded is £400.

Gordon Stirrat Portfolio Prize



This is a new prize in Reproductive Health and Care of the Newborn (Year 4), endowed by Prof Gordon Stirrat, formerly Professor of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Dean of Medicine and Pro-Vice

Chancellor. It is an annual prize for the best portfolio, but also requires good performance in written and SSC exams. For the academic year, 2016-2017, the prize has been won by Hannah Freer (below), Year 5. Well done Hannah! Harrison Carter (left below), a Year 5 medical student, was awarded the 'International MNI Award 2017', a €30,000 research prize at the European Society of Parenteral and Enteral Nutrition (ESPEN) in The Hague.



He has been awarded €30,000 to develop a medical and public health nutrition programme for UK medical students to help improve patient outcomes and implement strategies to advance nutritional care in clinical practice. His project was judged alongside 22 others from across the world and he is to be congratulated for being awarded the 1st prize.

Joanna Kondratowicz is taking a year out of the programme to tour the UK and European tennis circuit. Joanna got a first class degree in Bio Ethics then completed Year 3. She will be re-joining the programme next year
