SWOGS meeting, May 4th




Each May, obstetricians and gynaecologists from the South West of England meet to catch up on research, on clinical practice, and general news from the region.


This year, the


meeting was in Southampton and eight of our students (7 from Year 4 and one from Year 2), presented their iSSC work as posters.

Restart a Heart Day Meeting with Resuscitation Council UK



On 23rd May, student and staff representatives from nine UK medical schools were invited to meet the Resuscitation Council UK (RCUK), at the Royal College of General Practitioners, to plan and coordinate involvement in Restart a Heart day 2018 (RSAH). RSAH is a yearly day of action on 16th October with the aim of teaching life-saving CPR skills to as many people as possible; almost 200,000 last year. The 'exemplar' medical schools invited had demonstrated active involvement with community CPR teaching. Also present were members of the ambulance service, St John Ambulance and British Heart Foundation who help coordinate the event.

Representing Bristol were William Mears (4th year medical student, RMD and CPRiS Bristol) and Joanna Bruce-Jones (Co-Director RMD Bristol). Attendees were interested to hear about Bristol's innovative peer-led BLS teaching programme, RMD Bristol, which provides high quality training to all first-year medics. We also shared tips on running community CPR teaching, CPRiS Bristol having trained over 300 local children in BLS this year, while StreetDoctors have taught almost 150. The meeting was an excellent opportunity to forge links with other medical schools and a lasting partnership with the RCUK. Bristol Medical School aims to play a major part in RSAH 2018. outstanding result and thoroughly well-deserved to this dedicated and hard working team.


